WORKSHOPS & SPEAKERS

<u>Neighbors Naturescaping (for public spaces)</u> - Mary Lou Green, Executive Director; Elizabeth MacKenzie, Sustainability Outreach & Education Coordinator, Brightside St. Louis

Learn how Brightside's Neighbors Naturescaping program enables community groups in St. Louis city to establish community gardens in public spaces (e.g., parks, medians, vacant lots).

<u>Native Annuals and Perennials</u> – Bill Brighoff, Missouri Master Naturalist, St. Louis Wild Ones Learn how and why native plants are more beneficial to your landscape than exotic species. Plus learn how to enrich diversity in your garden, select plants for four seasons of color and interest and attract wildlife.

<u>Native Grasses</u> – Mark Grueber, Community Forester, Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) Learn about the importance of native grasses including how they protect and build soils, improve water filtration and attract wildlife.

<u>Rain Gardening</u> - Perry Eckhardt, Community Forester, Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) Installing a rain garden is a great way to manage storm water. Find out how you can install a rain garden and learn about native plants best suited for rainscaping.

<u>Dealing with Urban Soils</u> – Nathan Brandt, Horticulture Specialist, University of Missouri - Extension Different plants prefer different soil conditions and knowing the nutrient content, the physical properties, pH and contaminants present in your soil is important for the health of your plants. Learn the proper way to take a soil sample and what the results of your soil test mean.

Find out which trees, shrubs, perennials and grasses our winged friends prefer for food and shelter and see what these plants look like growing in our Demonstration Garden.
